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Hello Residents of East Fallowfield,

I am excited to announce that East Fallowfield Township is in the process of updating its 'Open Space, Recreation, and Environmental Resources Plan.' The Township retained Simone Collins Landscape Architecture to serve as the technical consultant for this project and formed a task force comprised of community members and stakeholders. The Township kicked off the engagement phase of the project with its first community meeting on June 26, and a second meeting was held on September 28 to allow for public input.



The last plan of this type was completed in 1993, and, as you can imagine, a lot has evolved in our Township since then. The focus of this project is to **create a new plan that reflects the changing needs of our community** as it relates to open space, park and recreational programming and park development. The updated plan will help guide our elected and appointed officials on how to improve, expand, repurpose, prioritize, maintain, staff, and fund our community's park assets and recreational opportunities. Furthermore, these plans open the door to potential grant funding for project implementation.

Your input is an important part of the plan.

So that we can properly assess the township's specific needs, we have established a robust **community engagement plan** that provides multiple opportunities to hear from you. Please tell us what parks and recreation amenities and programming you would like to see in East Fallowfield. We need you to help guide our vibrant future.

Come to a public meeting to discuss your ideas.

Are you craving a pickleball court? Do you want to see more walking trails? Are you interested in other amenities, programming, or active recreational facilities in East Fallowfield? Be sure to attend one of the next two upcoming community meetings that will be held at the Township Building at 2264 Strasburg Road on **Thursday, February 29, 2024, from 7-9 p.m. and Thursday, May 30, 2024, from 7-9 p.m.**

Township Purchases Land for Future Municipal Complex

East Fallowfield Township recently completed the purchase of a 10.9-acre parcel of land on Wilmington Road that is expected to become the site of a future municipal complex. The Board of Supervisors formally approved the property purchase at their board meeting last year and the transaction was finalized in 2023. The cost of the property was \$257,000, and the land was purchased using American Recovery Program Act (ARPA) funding, with no impact to the Township budget.

According to Board of Supervisors Chairman Wilson Lambert, "The Township's Board of Supervisors has been discussing the need for a new modern police station and administrative complex for many years.

"Both the police station and the administration building are old, cramped and inefficient, and lack many of the features you would expect in a modern facility necessary to provide the high level of service deserved by our residents," Lambert stated.

A Police Department Assessment Report completed in 2022 by the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) made the case that the current police station is too small and cited it as lacking the facilities needed for modern policing. East Fallowfield Township Police Chief Osborn explained, "Development of a new police station would enable our Police Department to better serve the community. A new police station would be designed with all the current best practices in policing and better equip the Police Department to achieve state accreditation."

Township Manager Scott Swichar added, "There is no more space on the grounds of the existing police station or at the

Township building to place additional buildings or offices." A new municipal complex would address that issue.

Township officials began exploring several potential sites a couple of years ago, but none of the sites met all the Township's needs. Early last year, a vacant property located at 221 Wilmington Road became available. It is located behind the now-closed South Brandywine Middle School. "The parcel sits on flat land, which suits the Township's needs perfectly," said Swichar.

The site can be accessed from either Wilmington Road or Doe Run Road and is centrally located, which is a huge plus. Another benefit is that the property is large enough to combine both the police department and township administration into one convenient location for residents. Public works operations would likely continue from their existing facilities.

"The purchase is a huge investment in the Township's future, but one that is being pursued in a tight, cost-effective manner, with avenues for public input along the way," stated Swichar. "However, this is the first step in the project and there is still a long way to go toward developing the land or building a new municipal complex." The Township will be undertaking a review of the specific building needs for the new site, with progress reports being provided periodically at the various Board and Committee meetings.

Further planning, design and ultimate construction of a new complex will be carried out in the future, as the Township prioritizes the project with both resident service and budgetary parameters in mind.

New Speed Signs



The East Fallowfield Police Department has obtained two new Radar Speed Signs for traffic calming purposes in East Fallowfield Township. The new Radar Speed Signs have been installed in the 2800 block of Strasburg Road and the 1600 block of West Chester Road.

There are two different models of Radar Speed Signs used by the East Fallowfield Police Department. The first model is solar powered and is considered to be semi-permanent, as it requires several people to move and install. The second sign is battery powered and more portable.

In addition to calming traffic by alerting drivers of their speed, the signs collect traffic data to inform police of areas where speeding is persistent, excessive, and additional enforcement is warranted. 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

East Fallowfield Township Completes Ambitious 2023 Road Paving Program

East Fallowfield Township is making significant progress in meeting the Road Maintenance Program goal to provide excellent street conditions throughout the Township. Municipal officials recently announced that road paving on Allegheny Drive, Juniata Drive, Octagon School Lane, Russell Circle, Armstrong Court, Weston Drive, Tasha Lane, Falon Lane, and Goosetown Road (South Caln Road to Eagle Glen) has been completed.

The Board of Supervisors awarded the 2023 Road Paving project to DiRocco Brothers, Inc. of West Chester, Pennsylvania which submitted the low bid of \$330,234.32 out of the six bids received. The Township had budgeted \$375,000 for the project.

East Fallowfield Township maintains 54.84 miles of roadway. "Repaving Township roads not only creates a smoother roadway surface, but also improves driver safety," said Township Manager Scott Swichar. "The Township places great importance on maintaining the roadway infrastructure."

East Fallowfield Township Park Gazebo Project Completed

Visitors to the Township's community park can now enjoy the outdoors in greater comfort, thanks to our beautiful new gazebo. The 36-foot octagon-shaped gazebo was installed at the park this past summer.

Just days after construction was complete, the Township held its first-ever live music event at the gazebo, featuring the very popular party band, 'The Fabulous Greaseband.' The event was a huge success, and the band appreciated the large, covered space that accommodated their instruments and equipment and offered shade for the musicians.

The gazebo structure is located close to the playground, so when it's not being used as a bandstand, parents can sit in the shade at the picnic tables while watching their children play. People can also use it for visiting with family or friends, playing cards together, or just sitting and enjoying a day at the park.


The Township's Board of Supervisors approved the purchase of the gazebo at their regular meeting in January. The total cost of the 36-foot octagon-shaped ADA-accessible structure was \$92,247. The gazebo was manufactured by Superior Recreation, and River Valley Recreation completed the installation of the structure. "The Township utilized a \$10,000 grant from the Brandywine Creek Greenway Mini Grant Award and a separate \$52,946 grant from the Chester County Municipal Grant Program," said Township Manager Scott Swichar. "The balance of the funding came from the Township's Park and Recreation Fund."

The structure is made almost entirely of metal, including the roof. However, the tongue-and-groove ceiling is constructed of pine wood, which gives the structure a more refined look. "This structure is built to last, and should be around for many decades," concluded Swichar.

NEIGHBORLY NATURAL LANDSCAPING:

Creating Natural Environments in Residential Areas

Are you tired of spending time and money mowing lawns? Try creating a natural landscape using native flowers, shrubs and trees instead. Local nurseries carry these native plants and the Penn State Extension website www.extension.psu.edu is a great resource for identifying native and non-native plants. This type of landscaping not only provides habitat for pollinators and local wildlife, but also has the added benefit of increasing rainwater infiltration and thereby reducing runoff.

Next time you are in the park, take a look at Tag's Memorial Garden to see what native plantings look like and how a lawn area can be converted into a native habitat that will improve the local environment and save you time and money on mowing grass. Watersheds 101

What are watersheds, and why is it important to protect them? Simply put, a watershed is the land area that drains to a common body of water. It temporarily stores and transports water from the land surface to the water body (stream, lake, river) and ultimately onward to the ocean. Healthy watersheds provide many ecosystem services that are necessary for our social and economic well-being, including water filtration and storage, air filtration, carbon storage, nutrient cycling, soil formation, recreation, food and timber.



SIMPLE WAYS HOMEOWNERS CAN PROTECT OUR WATERSHEDS

- **Plant a Rain Garden:** Rain gardens are plots full of native shrubs and flowers that are planted in a depression that is designed to capture stormwater runoff in the surrounding area. They prevent flooding and create habitat for pollinators and birds.
- **Reduce Use of Pesticides, Fertilizers & Deicing Chemicals:** Limiting household use of harmful chemicals can prevent nutrient overgrowth and plant/animal death in our waterways.
- **Plant Trees/Riparian Buffers:** Planting trees prevents flooding, lowers water temperatures, improves air quality, sequesters carbon and adds value to the neighborhood.

Recycling 101: When in Doubt, Throw it Out!

You gave your food cans and bottles a good rinse, stored them in a container separate from your household trash, and tossed in your clean mixed paper. You placed the recycling cart at the curb on collection day. Congratulations, you've recycled! Or have you?

Well, not exactly. You're doing the right thing, but it's just the first step in the recycling process – the "set out." Next, the hauler collects it, transports it to a Material Recovery Facility (MRF) for sorting and baling. These commodities will be marketed to a paper mill, plastics broker, or metal recycler to eventually be manufactured into new products.

Recycling is a process. Residents are the first step. So, who better to teach us about the processing other than MRF managers?

Jeff Furmanchin of Total Recycle in Birdsboro wants us to know, "Contamination in single stream recyclables is the largest cause of downtime and damage to processing equipment. Please keep hoses, wires, construction debris and yard waste out of your recycling. Lithium-Ion or rechargeable batteries of

any type need to stay out of recycling and trash bins, as they are an enormous fire hazard." (These batteries only belong in a household hazardous waste collection program!)

Scott Mengle, Director of SECCRA Landfill, manages a dozen drop off bins across southern Chester County. He says, "Just because an item bears a recycling symbol doesn't guarantee its actual recycling. This poses financial and logistical challenges, as non-recyclable items disrupt sorting, increase costs, and devalue recycled materials. To preserve the financial and environmental sustainability of recycling programs, it's important to know what is truly recyclable. 'When in doubt, throw it out' to ensure our success."

Matt Cogle of Cogle's Recycling wants us to know that water bottles (PET #1) are recycled into carpet and clothing. PET is also re-made into new bottles, closing the recycling loop. "It starts in your home. Keep food, liquids, and cigarette butts out of bottles. They make recycling much harder. Get those clean and loose (not bagged) bottles in the cart!"
